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## THE REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

## I. The following reports were heard by the Board and discussed:

A. Bobby Haggert, athletic trainer Toronto Maple Leafs, told the Board that Canadian athletic trainers had organized into an association of seventy five members - responsible officers had been elected - and that they had undergone a voluntary probationary period of one year - As spokesman for this Association Bobby proposed that the Board create a new district to include all of the Canadian Athletic Trainers.

B. Buck Ansel, Chairman of the Code of Ethics Committee gave the following report:

The committee is pleased to report there has been no specific incidence of unethical practices brought to its attention among our N.A.T.A. members during the 1965-66 school year.

There have been some questions raised as to what extent a trainer should be involved in representing or endorsing any company or product. These practices are widespread but at present are not thought to be detrimental to our organization. The committee will scrutinize these activities during the coming year to assure that our trainers exercise good taste in their outside associations.

C. Kenny Howard, Chairman of the Code of Conduct Committee gave a progress report - The closeness of the Code of Conduct to the Code of Ethics were discussed - Further action was tabled until the second board meeting to be held Tuesday.

- J. The treasurer announced that because of increased administrative expenses and since the Association is becoming involved in more and more liaison with the many allied Associations the Board was asked to consider raising the dues of membership.

AREAS OF REPRESENTATION:

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

As official representative of the N.A.T.A. to the National Federation of High School Athletic Association, I attended their 46th annual meeting held at Williamsburg, Virginia, on June 26-30, 1965. I attended the National Federation reception and banquet and was introduced as the official representative from the Trainers Association. I also attended all sessions that were open to all liaison delegates, with the exception of their national business meeting.

Over-all this was one of the most well organized meetings I have ever attended. Their lectures in the athletic sessions were very informative. I met many people in the world of high school athletics and enjoyed an exchange of ideas concerning the training profession, as well as the administration of high school programs.

2. AMA's Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports Conference, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
  - (a) Tom Healion served as program speaker and attended a contact luncheon as an official representative.
3. NCAA Annual Meeting, Washington, D. C.
  - (a) Bill Newell represented the Association.

N.C.A.A. MEETINGS

Executive meetings attended by Mr. Newell. Of interest to N.A.T.A. is the rule interpretation (see Recommended Policies and Practices for Intercollegiate Athletics - III - Personnel - Page 66 in Regulations Section of N.C.A.A. Bulletin for the 60th Annual Convention) that is apparently the basis for ruling that no trainer may work for a professional football team in early season camp. Also, the

strong warning against accepting money or items of monetary value for filling out report forms on athletes for professional athletic teams.

Section 6. Principles of Ethical Conduct.

(a) Individuals employed by or associated with member institutions for the administration, the conduct or the coaching of intercollegiate athletics, and students competing in intercollegiate athletics shall deport themselves with honesty and sportsmanship at all times to the end that intercollegiate athletics, as a whole, their institutions and they, as individuals, shall stand for the honor and dignity of fair play, and the generally recognized high standards associated with wholesome competitive sports. (Adopted 1/11/52).

(b) It shall be considered unethical conduct, under the terms of this principle, for a staff member of the athletic department of a member institution to receive compensation, directly or indirectly, for the scouting of athletic talent or the negotiating of talent contracts for professional sports organizations. (Adopted 1/9/59).

(c) The By-Laws shall provide for a committee to carry forward the principle of this Section. (Adopted 1/11/52).

CONSTITUTION

(a) Page No. 5: C3-6, the member institution becomes responsible for enforcing this legislation which limits athletic staff members' relationships with professional sports organizations.

4. American College Track Coaches Association Meetings, NCAA

(a) Bobby Gurn attended.

REPORT: U.S. TRACK & FIELD MEETINGS

Items of interest to N.A.T.A.: Chick Werner, Executive Secretary, U.S. Track & Field Federation reviewed plans of U.S.T.F.F. Sponsored Track and Field meets will be held throughout U.S.A. this winter and spring. U.S.T.F.F. will abide completely with decisions of Vice President, Humphrey's Arbitration Committee concerning N.C.A.A. -A.A.U. differences. N.C.A.A. athletes, at present, will not be penalized for participating in meets not sanctioned by U.S.T.F.F. Father Crowley of Santa Clara did a terrific job of reviewing U.S.T.F.F. history and purpose.

Much discussion, scientific and otherwise, on oxygen debt problem possibly facing distance runners in Mexico City in 1968. Consensus of opinion - that distance runners should train in high altitudes for at least four to six weeks before going to Mexico City.

In conversation with Mr. Nick Rode of U.S. State Department, it was again brought out that trainers would be much better represented on State Department sponsored athletic clinics and meets overseas if they were fluent in a foreign language. He was reminded that N.A.T.A. had a file, handled by our Executive Secretary, of athletic trainers capable of speaking a foreign language and he said that would prove very helpful in the future.

5. NCAA Football Rules Committee.

(a) Tom Healion, Advisory Representative.

REPORT TO THE NCAA FOOTBALL RULES COMMITTEE

1. RULE 3, SECTION 3, ARTICLE 3 -- REFEREE'S DISCRETIONARY TIME-OUT:

It is suggested that the Referee charge himself with a time-out to repair, or if unable to repair, replace a broken helmet and/or chin strap.

This situation is dangerous to the wearer, and he should not be in one play with the problem. A serious head injury could result.

The fit of a helmet has been stressed, and the wearer should be allowed a period of time to have his own helmet repaired. If this is impossible due to breakage, it should be replaced immediately.

The chin strap is a very important part of the fit of a helmet. If this is broken or lost, it should be replaced immediately.

2. KNEE INJURIES:

The management of knee injuries in football by the team physicians and consultant orthopedic surgeons in recent years has proven to be a great advancement in athletic medicine. The more modern practice of early operative intervention for the damaged cartilage or torn ligament, has produced a much higher incidence of recovery from the once-feared serious knee injury to the athlete. This greater number of surgical knees has made the public more aware of knee injuries, but it has also, in the high majority of cases, insured the athlete of returning to his sport with a sound knee, and the ability to continue his athletic career.

There has always been some discussion about the shoe cleats being a major factor in the cause of knee injuries. This has merit, since if the foot is not fixed in the ground, the knee would "ride with the blow", resulting in a less serious injury. However, we cannot completely eliminate the cleats on the shoes, since the ability to change direction quickly is a part of the

game. To do this, some type of cleated shoe is needed for traction.

Sporting goods manufacturers and independent researchers continue to study the problem of cleats. The newer polyethylene cleats have helped this problem tremendously, and the soccer-type shoe has been used by some teams to combat this problem. One study has shown that removing the heel cleats aids in reducing the severity of knee injuries. It is recommended that the NCAA Football Rules Committee encourage these groups to continue their study and research, and compliment them on the work that has been done.

### 3. REPORT ON THE MEDICAL SUPERVISION OF FOOTBALL:

For your information, a joint committee is being formed from the American College Health Association (Athletic Medicine Section), The National Athletic Trainers Association, and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The affiliation is proposed for the purpose of working and pooling resources in the area of athletic medicine. From this group, recommendations can be made to the Rules Committee that will assure the game of football of continued and improved medical supervision.

#### REPORT OF THE 1966 NCAA FOOTBALL RULES COMMITTEE MEETING

1. The NCAA Football Rules Committee has strongly recommended that the NCAA appropriate a sum of money necessary to conduct studies of football headgear, cleats, and practice and playing field turfs.
2. It will be mandatory that players occupying the offensive positions of center, guard, and tackle wear jersey numbers 50 thru 79. It is strongly recommended that the ends wear numbers 80 thru 99, the backs 1 thru 49, centers 50's, guards 60's, and tackles 70's.
3. All trainers should read and familiarize themselves with the following rules:
  1. The Football Code.
  2. Rule 1 - The Game, Field, Players, and Equipment.
  3. Rule 9 - Conduct of Players and Others Subject to the Rules.
4. "Pyramiding of players" was made illegal under Rule 9. (Pyramiding of players is where players climb on top of each other to block an extra point or field goal).
5. Dr. Owen B. Murphy of the University of Kentucky attended the meeting this year as a representative of the American Medical Association and it's Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports.



Dr. Murphy's presence was very well received by the Committee, and it was recommended that Dr. Murphy attend each year as a consultant on Medical matters.

6. I was appointed, by the Chairman, Mr. Ivan B. Williamson, to the Rules Committee's Sub-Committee on Equipment and Injuries.

7. AAHPER's Meeting, Chicago, Illinois.
  - (a) Bud Miller, Ball State, attended the representative assembly.

THE AAHPER REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY AT THE 81st AAHPER CONVENTION  
IN CHICAGO, ILLINOIS, ON MARCH 21, 1966

The alternate representative of the National Athletic Trainers Association was well recieved by the AAHPER Representative Assembly. He was seated with the other affiliated organizations representatives of which only six out of a total of twenty-four organizations were represented at the Representative Assembly.

Some of the topics covered and discussed in the Representative Assembly were: a proposed foundation in health, physical education, and recreation; a feasibility study on the possibility of a research and development center in the areas of health, physical education, and recreation; federal legislation concerned with the introduction of a bill to amend parts of the National Defense Education Act of 1958 to include school health and physical education; recommendations by the AAHPER Task Force on Research; Symposium on Federal Support Programs; accreditation; use of membership lists; and membership promotion. After a great deal of discussion, recommendations were made and were either approved by the Representative Assembly or held up for later consideration.

In most cases the topics and matters discussed in the AAHPER Representative Assembly did not have any direct bearing upon the National Athletic Trainers Association; however, this representative recommends that the National Athletic Trainers Association should carefully study the progress of the AAHPER in its efforts to develop a foundation in health, physical education, and recreation and a research and development center in these same areas. In the future

our organization may find it feasible to develop similar programs and the experience of the AAHPER in the development and establishment of these programs would prove valuable.

It is also the recommendation of this representative that the members of the National Athletic Trainers Association follow the lead of the AAHPER, which passed a resolution that urged all state associations to accept members regardless of race by July 1, 1966, and similarly require the adoption by the members of the N.A.T.A. of a resolution accepting members regardless of race.

Although this representative did not participate in any discussion on the following matter at the AAHPER Representative Assembly, it is my opinion that the N.A.T.A. should take advantage of the AAHPER's Editing and Production Unit which publishes books and pamphlets for the AAHPER and affiliated organizations. I believe that the N.A.T.A. should study this matter and try to develop some areas pertinent to athletic training for publication with the assistance of the AAHPER. It would be a wonderful opportunity for the N.A.T.A. to gain publicity besides a chance to educate the public and fellow colleagues of our cause.

#### AREAS OF ACTION:

1. An Advisory Representative has been appointed to the Medical Selection Committee on the USOC. Chuck Medlar, Penn State, who is also NATA representative to USOC has been appointed to serve in this advisory capacity.
2. An Advisory Relationship Committee has been appointed for the NCAA to include representatives of the NCAA, representing Administration; the American College Health Association, representing Team Physician and the NATA representing the Athletic Trainer. The representatives tentatively appointed for NATA are Millard Kelley -

Detroit Lions, Fred Hoover - Clemson University and Bill Newell - Purdue University. These appointments are subject to Board of Directors approval in June.

3. The Association has been elected to affiliate membership to AAHPER.
4. Last year, the Park-Davis Company was given permission to make a marketing survey for manufacturing. This report has been finalized and this office has received a copy of the full report.
5. The Board gave its approval for sanctioning an educational film.
6. This past year, the Association was approached with a proposal to work closely with organized baseball.
7. Walt Bakke, University of Wisconsin, who has served as Chairman of the Honorary Membership and Awards Committee since its beginning, is retiring as of July 1, 1966.

AREAS OF CONSIDERATION:

1. Because of increased administrative expenses and since the Association is becoming involved in more and more liaison with the many allied Associations, I feel that the Board of Directors should consider an increase in the amount of dues. We have not had an increase in dues since June 1958.
2. The Park-Davis report that was completed this past year is quite a detailed and lengthy report. It is far too expensive a project for us to publish and any condensation, I feel, would tend to misinform those reading the report. The Board should consider what is to become of this report.
3. The Association has been approached by allied Associations asking for some classification of membership, such as other Associations have in affiliations. This should be considered as a possibility.
4. The By-Law concerning active membership should be considered. At the present time, there is no restriction on a new member getting active status providing that he has been active in the field for a given period. Also, we do not have a By-Law governing reinstatement for reasons of delinquency in dues.
5. Last year the Board of Directors decided that the Board would also add their nominations to the Helms Hall of Fame. This item must be considered.
6. The job of coordinating the National program is becoming extensive enough that one person should coordinate the total. The coordinator of the National program, the Clinical program and publicity under one head. Also, the Chairman of the Committee on Committees has been charged with the responsibility of standing committee reports. I would suggest that Tom Healion, Assistant Executive Secretary be

given the responsibility of coordinating both of these two responsibilities--that of the National program and remain as Chairman of the Committee on Committees.

7. Last June, the National Clinical Program was reported. This is quite a lengthy volume and almost prohibitive in an attempt to edit and publish. The cost of the Association was in excess of \$250 without further work being done. The Board should consider what is to be done with the report and I would suggest, that in the future we be selective in reporting specific program speeches.
8. Walter Bakke, because of his retirement as Athletic Trainer to the University of Wisconsin, has asked to be replaced as Chairman of the Honorary Membership and Awards Committee. I would like to nominate in his place to fill out his unexpired term until June of 1968, Bill Dayton, Yale University. This item should be well considered.
9. I would like to have the Board consider the thought of the Association purchasing a permanent trophy that could be kept within the Association, and each member who enters the Helms Hall of Fame would have his name inscribed as a recipient of this award and the date. If we are to ask for help in the purchase of this trophy, I feel that it should include many persons and/or companies.
10. Twenty-five Year Membership has become a requisite for consideration to the Hall of Fame. I would ask that the Board consider making more detailed, the specifications for 25 year award membership. We should make a decision as to what actually constitutes active athletic training.

III. Other new business as heard by the Board was approved as recommended.

- A. The Board gave its approval for sanctioning an educational film by Glenn Educational Films Inc. called KEEP THEM IN ACTION prepared for Winthrop Laboratories, Division of Sterling Drug Inc. This has been completed and will be reviewed by the Board at the next meeting on Tuesday.
- B. 1. It was announced the Joint Commission (ACHA-NATA-NCAA-NFSHSAA) on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports would hold their first meeting Tuesday at 2 p.m. The affiliation is proposed for the purpose of working and pooling resources in the area of athletic medicine. It is the opinion of the four Associations representing the athletic trainers, team physicians, high school athletic administrators, and the NCAA athletic administrators as well as the rules makers would exert a positive influence in increasing and improving all athletics. C. These actions were discussed and approved:

1. Article IV - Dues

Section 1. Was changed to read:

The annual dues for membership of the National Association shall be six (6) dollars for all types of membership except honorary, advisory, and retired. Honorary, advisory, and retired members shall pay no dues.

2. Article I - Membership

Section 2. Active Membership:

Athletic Trainers from Universities, Colleges, Junior Colleges, Professional Football, Baseball, Basketball, Ice Hockey, High Schools, Preparatory Schools and Military Establishments, who are at present and have been actively engaged in the profession of athletic training for a period of five years and who has been a member of the Association for a period of two years and who are acceptable to the organization, shall be eligible for active membership. Each active member shall have the privilege of one (1) vote.

3. Last year the Board of Directors decided that the Board would also add their nominations to the Helms Hall of Fame. W. J. "Dutch" Luchsinger was unanimously nominated. His name will be nominated to the Helms Hall Board.
4. Tom Healion was given the duties as Assistant executive secretary of coordinating the National program, the clinical program and publicity and to continue as Chairman of the Committee on Committees.
5. The purchase of a permanent trophy as a Hall of Fame trophy by the Association that each member who enters the Hall of Fame would have his name inscribed as a recipient of this award and date was discussed. Further action was tabled for a future date.

#### MEMORIAL RESOLUTIONS

This man has contributed much to the Training Profession, especially in Iowa. Plus his son Art Jr., a very excellent trainer and administrator at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona.

ARTHUR D. DICKINSON, born 1896, August 15 in Shellsburg, Iowa. He was graduated from high school there in 1912. In high school Art was a star athlete playing basketball and baseball in school and on the "town" teams. He graduated from State College of Iowa, Cedar Falls, with a B.A. degree in Education. At State College he played football, basketball and baseball, he also won a letter "I" as a broad jumper. Art received his Masters Degree in Physical Education from Iowa University, Iowa City.

His teaching experience included one year at Adair, Iowa, High School, two years each at Washington and Marshalltown, Iowa, High Schools where he taught Health and Physical Education and was varsity coach of football, basketball and track.

Art moved to his Alma Mater as Trainer, Basketball and Track Coach in 1925. He was highly successful in both sports winning many conference championships over the span of years up to 1936 when he dropped basketball in favor of continuing in track and to devote more time to the Training Profession. He continued as track coach for 26 more years and again won many titles in and outside the conference. Art became a Professor Emeritus in 1964 but continued to help in the training room on a part time basis until his death, two weeks ago.

Art served in both World War I & II and was in France when peace was declared in each. He served in the 34th Division in World War I and as an Army Consultant in Track in World War II.

Art considered that his greatest loss was when he no longer could take care of the student athletes and that his greatest moment came when he was inducted into the Helms Hall of Fame in 1965. He will be sorely missed by his family, his host of friends and by the profession in which he played so prominent a part.

SECOND BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

Hotel Muehlebach

Tuesday, June 14, 1966

- I. The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Bobby Gunn.
- II. Mr. John Baruch, Director of Promotion and Marketing, Winthrop Laboratories, and Mr. Jack Friedman, Glenn Educational Films, made a presentation to the Board of the manuscript and filmstrip entitled "Keep them in Action" and also of an instructor's manual to be prepared to guide trainers, teachers, etc., who use the filmstrip in the best use of this medium. This manual will accompany each filmstrip. The booklet they intend to prepare will be designed for distribution to students and athletes and will be supplied in quantities requested by the instructor. The presentation was discussed, after reviewal, and changes were suggested, namely: -

Glenn Educational Films were asked to portray the athletic trainer in a more consistent role in keeping with his position on the athletic medical team. Unanimous approval was given by the Board to put the Association's name on the filmstrip.

- III. It was reported that the Sheraton-Columbus Motor Hotels, Inc., Columbus, Ohio had been confirmed as the headquarters hotel for next year's annual program. June 11-14 have been confirmed as the dates. Ernie Biggs has been selected as Program Chairman.
- ✓IV. Kenny Howard, Chairman of the special committee on Code of Conduct, gave a report, with the following recommendations:-
- a. The Code of Conduct and Ethics Committee can and should be combined.
  - b. Dress, at all times, should be in keeping with the dignity of our institutions, profession, and appropriate to the occasion.
  - c. Misleading promotion and conflicts of interest should be avoided.  
One way this may be attained is by the companies paying their trainer representatives by fee instead of commission.

These recommendations were approved by the Board.

The Code of Conduct Committee was dissolved. The name of the Code of Ethics Committee was changed to read - Code of Ethics and Conduct Committee.

These suggestions, as approved, should be carried back to the districts by the individual Directors.

- V. Chuck Medlar, representative to the USOC and our advisor to the Medical and Training Services Committee, discussed the nominations by the districts of athletic trainers for the Pan American summer and winter games. He suggested that a typewritten list of all nominations be sent to both -

and

University Park, Pennsylvania 16802

The Board voted to eliminate the appointment of a trainer to one of the Games he had been assigned to before. The exception would be perhaps the head trainer, as the thinking of the Medical Services Committee and the United States Olympic Board of Directors may be that they would want the head trainer to be someone who had the experience of working either respective game.

It was suggested that this be accomplished by the first of August. This report was accepted.

- VI. Porky Morgan, Chairman of the 25-Year Awards Committee, reported that a new form of application for this award, containing necessary additions for information, had been developed. The committee was satisfied that through the proper use of the application form by the districts adequate clarification of athletic training time could be established.
- VII. The American College of Sports Medicine, through Dr. Kenneth Clarke, requested that the Association appoint a member to represent the National Athletic Trainers Association on the ACSM's Inter-Disciplinary Coordination and Advisory Committee.
- The Secretary was instructed after receiving a list of all members, who are also members of the ACSM, from Dr. Clarke to make this appointment.
- VIII. The Chairman of the Professional Advancement Committee requested that there be an extension of time from June, 1968, to June, 1971, to permit the certification of the active membership. This was approved.
- IX. The Board requested the Secretary to complete the minutes of all meetings of 1966 and to mail them to the Directors within one month. They also requested that the areas of action and items to be considered at next year's Board meeting be presented to them in February. These requests will be followed.
- X. It was reported that several of the members who have entered the Hall of Fame would like to have a lapel button or card so designating them as a Hall of Fame member. It was suggested that

this be followed up by George Sullivan, Chairman of the Helms Hall of Fame nominating committee, with the Helms Hall Board. Anything that the National Athletic Trainers Association does in this respect must carry the approval of both organizations.

There being no further business, requiring action at this time, the meeting was adjourned.
