Dear Director:-

I am sending to you some suggestive areas of consideration for you to look over. There does not appear to be many items, however, some of the items will require much thought and deliberation.

ITEM NO. 1

*Longer term
District
option*

Most of the Directors have been serving a two year term as Director, as was suggested some years ago. You should consider including this in either the Constitution or the Bylaws. Also, I do not believe there have been any provisions made through the districts to keep part of the Directors over for the new Board. It might be good business to alternate districts every year, or some other means of retaining at least half of the Directors. This should be discussed.

ITEM NO. 2

Good idea

In June 1968 at Houston, Texas the Board must consider a new cycle of meeting sites. Consideration should be given to a guide line of selective national meeting sites. Attention should be given so that any or all who wish to nominate a city for consideration may have an opportunity to do so. It seems to me that if everyone is permitted to speak for a given city, this will be a time consuming and lengthy affair. Perhaps nominations can be received by the Board and considered at a time other than the Directors annual meeting. If each district would select the outstanding city within its district, that is most suitable for our type of national meeting, this city could be screened for hotels, entertainment, transportation in and out of the city, etc., and after the district is unified in its selection this city could be presented in nomination for consideration by the Board.

ITEM NO. 3

The present Constitution and Bylaws were brought up to date two years ago, and included all of the additions in the Bylaws at that date. The Board should consider instructing a permanent committee to constantly review the Constitution and Bylaws. Then where there are weaknesses, it may be brought to the Boards attention, that they may consider legislation to correct these weaknesses.

EXAMPLE:

ARTICLE VIII - ORGANIZATION

Section 1.

National: The governing body of this association shall be a Board of Directors, made up of the Directors of the nine districts of the association. This term of office shall run from the termination of the National Convention and last for one year.

(a) The Board of Directors will elect one of its members as Chairman of the Board. Nominations shall be made from the floor. Such elections shall be held annually.

(b) The Board of Directors shall meet immediately preceding and after the annual convention.

Dear Directors:-

If everything works out as it should, I would like to call a meeting of all the old and new directors for 9 O'clock A.M., Sunday, June 11, or as soon as possible after that. I would like to add that a new director may enter into the discussion, but may not vote unless he is the only representative from his district present at the meeting.

During the year 1966-67, the National Athletic Trainers Association again improved its position in the three major areas of concern - ATHLETICS, MEDICINE AND EDUCATION.

AREAS OF ACTION:

1. Our cooperative efforts in the development of an Education Filmstrip for young athletes, produced by Glenn Educational Films, Inc. and Winthrop Laboratories, has been concluded. Each of you were to have received a copy of the completed Filmstrip.
2. Our work with the Athletic Institute is still under development and consideration. I should have a report for you either before or during our Annual Board meeting in June.
3. A letter of agreement between Ellis Murphy, Inc. and the National Athletic Trainers Association was signed for Ellis Murphy, Inc. to administer the publication of the N.A.T.A. Journal for the year 1967 to include four quarterly issues. This appears to be a very satisfactory arrangement.
4. Nominations were received from each of the districts for personnel to the Summer Olympics, Pan American games and the Winter Olympics. These were forwarded to the Selection Committee of the USOC.
5. The Athletic Training Program that included the acceptable minimal requirements for the education of future athletic trainers, was mailed to the individual active membership for re-evaluation and voting - 528 were mailed. To date 289 have replied, 39 have disapproved, 12 have approved with revisions.

AREAS OF CONSIDERATION

1. Most of the Directors have been serving a two year term as Director as was suggested some years ago. You should consider including this in either the Constitution or the Bylaws. Also, I do not believe there have been any provisions made through the districts to keep

part of the Directors over for the new Board. It might be good business to alternate districts every year, or some other means of retaining at least half of the Directors. This should be discussed.

2. In June 1968 at Houston, Texas the Board must consider a new cycle of meeting sites. Consideration should be given to a guide line of selective national meeting sites. Attention should be given so that any or all who wish to nominate a city for consideration may have an opportunity to do so. 3. The present Consitution and Bylaws were brought up to date two years ago, and included all of the additions in the Bylaws at that date. The Board should consider instructing a permanent committee to constantly review the Constitution and Bylaws. Then where there are weaknesses, it may be brought to the Board's attention, that they may consider legislation to correct these weaknesses.

EXAMPLE:

ARTICLE VIII - ORGANIZATION

Section 1.

National: The governing body of this association shall be a Board of Directors, made up of the Directors of the nine districts of the Association. This term of office shall run from the termination of the National Convention and last for one year.

(a) The Board of Directors will elect one of its members as Chairman of the Board. Nominations shall be made from the floor. Such elections shall be held annually.

(b) The Board of Directors shall meet immediately preceeding and after the annual convention.

4. Each year the Association is asked to cooperate or support some form of educational visual aid programming. The Board should consider the formation of a separate and new Committee to undertake the coordination of this activity.
5. The Board should consider whether or not to certify all of the active membership to include all of those who were not certified during the last certification. The next certification date had been set arbitrarily for June 1972, but I see no reason why those who have missed certification should not be included on a yearly basis prior to that date.
6. There is one item of business still hanging from two years ago. This concerns the possible new classification of membership to include people who do not fit one of the other classifications. The Board should make a decision on this item.

7. I have recently received a copy of a Survey being made of the Eastern district. Copies of all correspondence with Gary Soderberg and this office are enclosed. He has made specific request that consideration be given to a survey of the Active membership next fall. This action should be considered by the Board.

SEVERAL ITEMS OF BUSINESS TO BE DISCUSSED AT THE DIRECTORS MEETING ARE:

1. The Chairman of the Committee on Committees has received all reports from the Committee Chairman and will make his report to the Board. This should include all recommendations made to him along with his own for consideration. New committee personnel must be selected for the following committees for a term of three (3) years:
- Membership Committee - 3 men representing Districts #2, #5 and #8
 - Code of Ethics - 2 men representing the nation
 - Injury - 2 men representing the nation
 - Constitution & ByLaws- 1 man representing the nation
 - Twenty-five Year Award-2 men representing the nation
 - Honorary Memberships and Awards -1 man representing the nation
2. The special committees should be heard since their reports should be made only to the Board. These are the Nominating Committee to the Helms Hall Board and the Professional Advancement Committee. Also, reports should be heard from NATA representatives to the various associations, e.g.; U.S. Olympic Association, NCAA, AAHPER, NFSHSAA, APTA, AMA'S Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports, American Football Coaches Association, NCAA Football Rules Committee, National Basketball Federation Meeting, Canadian Medical Aspects of Sports Conference, ACHA, Joint Commission on Competitive Safeguards & Medical Aspects of Sports (ACHA-NATA-NCAA-NFSHSAA)

I would like permission to invite as ex-officio members of the Board to our meeting on Sunday, Jules Reichel, as Chairman of the Constitution and ByLaws Committee and Tom Healion, as Chairman of the Committee on Committees and also as Assistant Executive Secretary, to represent their committees. Naseby Rhinehart, Chairman of the Membership Committee, Buck Andel, Chairman of the Code of Ethics, Chuck Medlar, Representative to the USOC and Advisor to the Medical Selections Committee, USOC, George Sullivan as Chairman of the Nominating Committee to the Helms Hall Board and Frank Cramer, Honorary member, as well as any other Honorary members who might be present, to enter any discussion in an Advisory capacity.

The new board meeting, to be held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, along with any new business, should receive a detailed report of next year's meeting progress. A representative of District No. 6 will give this report. I would like to ask as ex-officio members to this meeting, Warren Ariail, Exhibits Manager to present his requirements and Jules Reichel, Chairman of the Constitution and ByLaws Committee. I hope that the new directors will make every effort to stay for this meeting. A quorum for the Board was established at five (5).

If you or any member of your district have any new business that should be on the agenda, would you please notify me or Bobby Gunn, Board Chairman, so that it may be presented and acted upon.

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THE REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

I. The following reports were heard by the Board and discussed:

A. The Board heard by letter a report of the Editor of the Journal of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

"This is just a note to let you know that the Journal is about to blossom. I have been receiving more material than I can possibly handle or use. More and more of the trainers are sending in great articles, but in doing so (being of quality) have sent in manuscripts that are documented, and lengthy. In so doing, I can hardly use them. The problem is that we have too few pages to use now for articles. If we increased the number of pages in the Journal we could publish more articles and also have room for other ideas I feel would be worthwhile in the Journal, i.e., Letter to the Editor, Literature available in Athletic Training, Calendar of Events, etc.

Ellis Murphy is doing a great job for us, not only in handling the printing of the Journal but in bringing in monies for advertisements. The only gripe I have had from him from this end is that the material is too lengthy for the room he has to put it in. Therefore, he has had to cut some material up (which isn't too good an idea), and at other times leave some out. This makes it hard for me to correlate, etc.

My suggestion is to increase the amount of pages possible in the Journal."

1. Mr. Roberson asked specifically that there be an increase in the number of pages in the Journal.

This was approved.

- B. A letter of agreement has been introduced by Ellis Murphy, Inc. to increase the size of the Journal from 16 pages plus cover to 20 pages plus cover.

"This constitutes a letter of agreement between Ellis Murphy, Inc. and the National Athletic Trainers Association for Ellis Murphy, Inc. to administer the publication of NATA Journal for the remainder of 1967 and for 1968 - four quarterly issues per year.

There is to be a September and December issue in 1967, and a March, June, September and December issue in 1968, mailed on approximately the 20th day of the month preceding the month of issue, (i.e. the March issue is to be mailed on the 20th of February).

All editorial copy and illustrative material are to be provided via Marvin Roberson, or such other individual as the Association Board shall designate, but all material shall come to Ellis Murphy, Inc. from one individual, and shall arrive at the office of Ellis Murphy, Inc. 30 days prior to the mailing of the issue in question.

Ellis Murphy, Inc. will read copy for grammatical and 'style' accuracy, schedule the type and the headlines, send copy and illustrative material to the printer, read page proofs, and see that the printer delivers the magazines in bulk to the Lafayette Mailing Service, 3315 South Street, Lafayette, Indiana, for mailing.

The printing will be done by a firm selected by Ellis Murphy, Inc. but approved by the Editor. The printer's bill shall not exceed \$1155.00 for a twenty (20) page plus cover issue with three additional covers in the outside form.

Ellis Murphy, Inc. is to be compensated at the rate of \$25.00 per editorial page for the work outlined above. This is to be over and above the compensation received for acting as advertising manager, which services shall continue and be an adjunct to the new services outlined in this letter.

The Lafayette Mailing Service Company will mail fifty (50) copies of each issue to Ellis Murphy, Inc. upon receipt of each shipment, to be used for billing purposes and to answer inquiries pertaining to advertisements.

In addition to the set fee per page, Ellis Murphy, Inc. will be reimbursed for reasonable expenses such as long distance calls, postage and other expenses incurred in carrying forward the publication of the Journal". Ellis Murphy, Inc.

Permission was granted the Executive Secretary to sign the new Agreement.

- C. Mr. Jim Goostree, University of Alabama, gave a report on the results obtained of the new punting rule survey. It was decided that in light of the material presented that a resolution carrying the support of the Association be sent to the Chairman of the NCAA Football Rules Committee, through Advisory Representative to that Committee, Tom Healion, expressing the Associations concern.

Resolution:

"It is resolved, in view of the information presented regarding the possibility of increased incidence of injury, the general feeling of the majority of the membership of the National Athletic Trainers Association and the Board of Directors of the NATA, that the NCAA Football Rules Committee strongly consider rescinding, prior to the Fall of 1967, the New Rule (1967) pertaining to the punting situation and revert back to the rule prior to this change".

D. Chuck Medlar, Representative to the United States Olympic Committee gave a report of the presentation of nominations to the Medical Services Committee and a follow-up report. A complete list of athletic trainer assignments were presented as follows:

The Board accepted the report and commended Mr. Medlar for the manner in which his duties have been carried out.

E. A letter was read from the Basketball Federation of the United States with a request that a representative from the NATA be appointed for the NCAA University Finals to be held in Los Angeles, California. Bill Chambers, Fullerton Junior College was appointed to represent the Association.

F. It was suggested that a clarification of the selection of representation be made to the membership. The clarification is:

"No one shall be considered for representation except by the action of the Board of Directors. Considerations by the Board shall be that because of economics area representation shall always be a consideration unless it is important that continuity be a prime factor in selection".

- G. Millard Kelley, Detroit Physical and Athletic Rehabilitation Clinic gave a report of his representation to the American College Health Association meeting in Washington, D.C. The Board made a special request that even though Mr. Kelley is no longer active in athletic training that he continue as the Associations representative to the ACHA until a suitable replacement can be made.
- H. George Sullivan, Chairman of the Nominating Committee to the Helms Hall of Fame gave a report of nominations and selections for this year.

The Board empowered Mr. Sullivan to seek out a suitable location for a picture Hall of Fame to supplement the existing Helms Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame and to report back to the Board his findings. No nominations for the Hall of Fame Award came from the Board this year.

1. "It was voted unanimously to have a more strict enforcement of the 'spearing' rule in the football code. The helmet is for protection to the wearer, and not to be used as a weapon. This will be referred to the commissioners and football game officials.

- 2. It was recommended the grabbing of the face guard be more strictly enforced. This was also referred to the commissioners and football game officials.
- 3. Dr. O.B. Murphy of the University of Kentucky, has expressed an interest, and will conduct a study of grass and turfs for football fields at his University. This study is to reflect a possible cause of knee injuries in football. The committee gave this project it's full support.
- 4. The equipment and injuries sub-committee is working actively to appoint a committee to look into the possibility of establishing minimum requirements for football headgears. This would be important to combat the fatal injuries occurring in high school and sandlot football due to improper football headgears.
- 5. Rule 1 of the rule book was brought up-to-date pertaining to the covering on knee pads and thigh guards. It now states that they must be covered with 1/4" on all sides, front and back, with a closed cell, non-absorbent material. This change was due to the new and better materials now available. The old rule called for 1/2" of sponge rubber. This recommendation was given to the editorial committee for exact wording.
- 6. Dr. Richard C. Schneider, a Neuro-Surgeon at the University of Michigan, presented his film and slides on head and neck injuries to the committee. This was well received, and pointed out the need for more strict enforcement of the spearing and grabbing of the face guard rules. It also showed flagrant offenders using an illegal use of the forearm and arms. The committee recommended that this film be seen by all those who are actively involved in the supervision of the game of football".

7. AAHPER'S MEETING, Las Vegas, Nevada

- a. Art Dickinson, Jr., Arizona State, attended the representative assembly.

"As AAHPER increases in size and scope, affiliation by NATA becomes a greater political necessity and of lesser personal benefits to the athletic trainer. The section on athletic training and the committee on the health aspects of sports of AAHPER, which were the sources for professional information and public relations have been discontinued. Conversely, assistance of AAHPER in instituting a college curriculum for the training of athletic trainers, and functioning as a source for many services make affiliation of NATA with AAHPER of decided value.

Other than a \$5.00 raise in yearly membership dues, there was no action taken at the representative assembly, or resolutions passed that were pertinent to NATA. The booklet "Desirable Athletic Competition for Children", authored by a joint committee of AAHPER and the Society for State Directors is now ready for publication".

8. National Basketball Federation Meeting, Louisville, Kentucky

- a. Mel Blickenstaff, Indiana State University

Notes taken from the Meeting:

- 1. "B.F.U.S.A. is an organization designed to promote basketball throughout the world.

- 2. There is a distinct problem of friction between the B.F.U.S.A. and the A.A.U., because of the N.C.A.A. feud with the A.A.U.
- 3. B.F.U.S.A. was turned down on its application for membership in the Olympic Selection Committee because of this feud.
- 4. The A.A.U. has required the B.F.U.S.A. to furnish reports which are used to threaten the eligibility of athletes from the U.S.A. colleges, and foreign countries.
- 5. The State Department is now favoring the B.F.U.S.A., and allows it to pick out teams to go to other countries at government expense. Foreign teams sanctioned by B.F.U.S.A. can be brought in to the U.S.A. with State Department finances.
- 6. B.F.U.S.A. can sanction and give permission to play foreign teams provided it is not an Olympic team, all star team, or a national team.
- 7. Any basketball team wanting to travel abroad should contact John Bunn. He can give all of the details. Valparaiso is planning a trip to Europe next year. Many other colleges are planning tours to foreign countries.
- 8. Club and college teams cause no problems for B.F.U.S.A. but Olympic and All Star teams are controlled by A.A.U.

B.F.U.S.A. Activities:

- 1. Last year B.F.U.S.A. sanctioned teams played over 200 basketball games in 30 different countries.
- 2. This year there will be over 400 games in 36 different countries.
- 3. Clinics and demonstrations were given to over 200,000 people.
- 4. Coaches from foreign countries were brought to the U.S.A. to be indoctrinated in our techniques of basketball.
- 5. Literature, pictures, and information was sent to many foreign countries.
- 6. The B.F.U.S.A. tried to make arrangements with the F.I.B.A. to bring in people from foreign countries to see basketball tournaments, but without success.
- 7. Arrangements were made with Pepsi-Cola to film N.C.A.A. basketball finals. Four films were made and have toured 10-12 countries. Very favorably received.
- 8. Gulf Oil Company has sponsored Ventures for Victory, and has organized teams with 20-40 game schedules.
- 9. A.B.A. is setting up national tournaments with club teams using height limitations. (Example 5'10" maximum).

Summary:

If I were to summarize the purpose of the B.F.U.S.A. committee, I would say this is a dedicated group of men and women trying to sell basketball to the sports-minded people of the world. In regard to the N.C.A.A. and A.A.U. feud, it appears B.F.U.S.A. is not a power grasping organization, but is attempting to help as many as possible without regard to power or money. The A.A.U. seems to be the exact opposite with a strangle hold on track and designs on all other sports activities.

I asked John Bunn what we as trainers could do to help the B.F.U.S.A. He would like for us to help by telling as many people as possible what the B.F.U.S.A. is attempting to do".

9. Canadian Medical Aspects of Sports Conference
 - a. Tom Healion, Northwestern University, served as Program Speaker.
10. American College Health Association Meetings, Washington, D.C.
 - a. Millard Kelley attended as official representative for N.A.T.A.

"The annual meeting of the American College Health Association was held at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D.C. on 28, 29, 30, 31 of March 1967.

The Athletic Medicine section meetings were well attended by team physicians from throughout the United States, as well as some trainers. Members of the N.A.T.A. present were, Kent Falb, Detroit Lions, Joe Cuzzo, Washington Redskins, Tom Pike, University of Connecticut, and Otho Davis, Duke University. The program was well organized and presented.

As is customary with this group of physicians much is learned from their frank discussions following each presentation. Attendance at their informal meetings on athletic medicine is an educational experience second to none.

In my association with this group over the past few years, I cannot say enough complimentary things about them. Their experience in the management of athletic injuries is vast. Their recognition of and cooperation with the N.A.T.A. has been unmatched by any other group that I know of. The membership of this section is broad in age and experience and I strongly believe that the N.A.T.A. should seek a closer working relationship with them. If they have their meetings in your area, plan to attend - you are always welcome.

The section on Athletic Medicine is one of many sections of the American College Health Association. The membership of the Association is made up of all the personnel employed in the Student Health Services of Colleges and Universities throughout the United States. The N.A.T.A. is but one of a vast number of organizations that send liaison representatives to the A.C.H.A. meetings. I attended a meeting of these representatives, and it was interesting to observe the interest of all groups in the Association. It also was enlightening to become aware of the increasingly important role the Student Health Service is playing in the surrounding community.

Of all the relationships I have enjoyed as a member of the N.A.T.A., the one I will regret severing more than any other is with the A.C.H.A. I recommend that you give serious consideration to the member you select to represent the N.A.T.A. at their future meetings".

11. Joint Commission on Competitive Safeguards & Medical Aspects of Sports (ACHA-NATA-NCAA-NFSHSAA) - Houston, Texas

a. Bobby Gunn and William E. Newell

"The first item of business was the discussion of the fatality studies. Chairman Blyth stated in his report that the information must remain confidential until the fatality study has been published. It was brought out in the report that heat stress injury had been greatly reduced and that much credit must be given to the publicity and educational information initiated by the Heat Stress and Heat Exhaustion Press Conference called by the AMA's Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports in Chicago, Illinois July 24, 1966.

Dr. Combs discussed the excellent reception given the heat stress letter endorsed by the head football coaches of the three major institutions in Indiana. The letter was sent to each of the state's high schools participating in football through the cooperation of the Indiana State High School Athletic Association.

The Committee was urged to continue to do something with head concussion injury. Most of the injuries to the high school athlete involved the head and neck. This might be accomplished best by seeking changes or better enforcement of existing rules (particularly those dealing directly with spearing). It was pointed out that Dr. Don Slocum and the AMA's Committee on Medical Aspects of Sports has made a study of head and neck injuries.

The recommendation made by the Joint Committee at its last meeting on June 14, 1966 in reference to conditioning five days prior to the approved opening day of practice, was not approved by the NCAA Council. This action was discussed. It was suggested that an amendment on conditioning be proposed from the floor at the meeting of the Governing Council at this session. It was recommended that the amendment on conditioning be attached to the amendment concerning play and practice sessions. Directors Bill Orwig and Frank Carver as voting delegates of the NCAA Governing Council will introduce the amendment on conditioning.

The amendment on conditioning was not approved by the NCAA Governing Council. Mr. Art Bergstram, Assistant to Director, suggested that we reintroduce the amendment on conditioning to the Executive Committee that will meet in July 1967.

Ways and means of educating athletic personnel on health and conditioning problems were discussed. It was pointed out that the athlete would benefit most by this information. It was suggested that information on athletic health and conditioning be presented to the coaches at their various regional and state coaches clinics. It was suggested that the team physician and athletic trainer make themselves available to the directors of the clinics as speakers. This would result in greater cooperation and understanding between the medical and coaching professions and thereby secure their cooperation in the recommended procedures for the prevention of athletic injuries. Each member of the committee was encouraged to take this recommendation to their own associations for implementation.

Chairman Blyth announced that a request had been received by the Committee asking that a survey be made concerning the disc type or Handley Heel. After a brief discussion, it was decided that there should not be a survey of this type at this time.

There was a discussion concerning the relative merits of the Astrodome Tower Turf. Dr. Cooper was directed to survey past football participants in the Astrodome and to relay the opinion of coaches and players to the committee.

The other recommendation made by this committee in June 1966 on the establishment of a policy whereby a prospective athlete, prior to acceptance of application for admission, be given an examination by a university physician to determine his medical eligibility for athletic participation, was discussed. It was proposed that we discuss this recommendation at our next scheduled meeting.

The abuse of drugs was discussed. It was decided that no definite action can be taken by the committee. Other miscellaneous items discussed were mouthpieces.

Chairman Blyth asked to be relieved of his duties as Chairman. Nominations were called for from the floor. Samuel I. Fuenning, M.D. was elected Chairman of the Commission.

The selection of the next business meeting site was discussed. It was noted that the next meeting in rotation should be in conjunction with the NFSHSAA. Since their meeting this year is to be in Hawaii, it was decided to meet elsewhere. An invitation was then extended to the Committee to again meet with NATA in Columbus, Ohio during the second week of June. This invitation was accepted".

12. American College of Sportsmedicine, Las Vegas, Nevada

- a. William E. Newell, Purdue University served as Program Speaker. Arthur Dickinson, Arizona State University attended initial meeting of an Interdisciplinary Coordination and Advisory Committee -

" An initial meeting of an Interdisciplinary Coordination and Advisory Committee was held on Thursday, March 9. This committee includes a representative of each of the disciplines of athletic medicine, health education, coaching, athletic training, physiology, physical education and clinical medicine. Jim Conboy will now be the representative to this committee from NATA.

The chairman of this committee stated that the Board of Directors of the college were aware of the need to expand the program and purpose of this organization towards greater inclusion of athletic medicine and athletic training. The resulting increase in exchange of information and services would be of benefit to each of the many disciplines that make up the College of Sports Medicine".

AREAS OF ACTION:

1. Our cooperative efforts in the development of an Education Filmstrip for young athletes, produced by Glenn Education Films, Inc. and Winthrop Laboratories, has been concluded.
2. Our work with the Athletic Institute is still under development and consideration.

3. A letter of agreement between Ellis Murphy, Inc. and the National Athletic Trainers Association was signed for Ellis Murphy, Inc. to administer the publication of the N.A.T.A. Journal for the year 1967 to include four quarterly issues. This appears to be a very satisfactory arrangement.
4. Nominations were received from each of the districts for personnel to the Summer Olympics, Pan American games and the Winter Olympics. These were forwarded to the Selection Committee of the USOC.
5. The Athletic Training Program that included the acceptable minimal requirements for the education of future athletic trainers, was mailed to the individual active membership for re-evaluation and voting - 528 were mailed.

AREAS OF CONSIDERATION

1. Most of the Directors have been serving a two year term as Director, as was suggested some years ago. It was considered to include this in either the Constitution or the Bylaws. There have been no provisions made through the districts to keep part of the Directors over for the new Board.
ACTION: Tabled until next year.
2. In June 1968 at Houston, Texas the Board must consider a new cycle of meeting sites. Consideration was given to a guide line of selective national meeting sites. If each district would select the outstanding city within its district, that is most suitable for our type of national meeting, this city could be screened for hotels, entertainment, transportation in and out of the city, etc., and after the district is unified in its selection this city could be presented in nomination for consideration by the Board.
ACTION: Tabled until next year.
3. The present Constitution and Bylaws were brought up-to-date two years ago, and included all of the additions in the Bylaws at that date. The Board considered instructing a permanent committee to constantly review the Constitution and Bylaws and to recommend legislation to the Board.
ACTION: Approved.
 - a. Changes made at this meeting by the Board are as follows:
 - "Under Article VI - Committees
 - Section 2
 - (F) Constitution and By-Laws: Chairman and two members - A permanent committee to be responsible for classification of legislation enacted by the association and incorporation of that legislation into the Constitution and By-Laws and to constantly review and recommend Legislation to the Board of Directors.

Under Article VI - Committees
Section 4

All committees are set up on a rotating basis, term of appointment to be three years.

Under Article IX - Amendments
Section I

These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the Board of Directors of the Association".

4. Each year the Association is asked to cooperate or support some form of educational and visual aid programming. The Board considered the formation of a separate and new Committee to undertake the coordination of this activity.

ACTION: It was decided to investigate further.

- √5. The Board considered whether or not to certify all of the active membership to include all of those who were not certified during the last certification. The next certification date had been set arbitrarily for June 1972. This is to be brought to the attention of the district secretaries.

ACTION: Approved.

6. There is one item of business still hanging from two years ago. This concerns the possible new classification of membership to include people who do not fit one of the other classifications.

ACTION: Tabled second Board Meeting.

J. A report was heard from the Professional Advancement Committee that included these proposals:

1. Those who voted "No" on the re-examination of professional preparation of the Athletic Trainer as well as anyone else who so desires be given an opportunity to express in writing to the Board of Directors why they voted "No".
- √2. To be considered for certification the applicant must have spent at least two years under direct supervision of an active member of N.A.T.A. be added to the list of basic minimal requirements.
3. Each Director at his district meeting or through correspondence should instruct any member who desires to establish Association approval of the athletic training curriculum at his school to submit a copy of their curriculum to the Professional Advancement Committee or such committee as the Board selects,
4. Recommended Sayers Miller, Ball State; Lindsey McLean, San Jose State; Tow Diehm, New Mexico University be appointed to the Professional Advancement Committee and that Sam Fuenning, M.D. be asked as an Advisory member subject to their approval.

ACTION: Tabled to second Board Meeting.

K. A combined report was heard from the Chairman of the Committee on Committees. Membership - Naseby Rhinehart, Montana State University

Doctor Francis J. Sweeny, team physician for the New York Football Giants and Manhattan College, passed away December 2nd, 1966 at St. Elizabeth Hospital in New York. He was stricken after attending a basketball game at Manhattan College, the night before and brought to his Hospital, for he worked out of St. Elizabeth's. He was 72 years of age, forty of these years were devoted to athletics, athletes and their injuries

Doctor Sweeny was a graduate of Manhattan Preparatory School, Manhattan College and the Georgetown University School of Medicine. Athletes, both young and active, and older and retired will miss his familiar figure at the Sports Arena. He was a true friend of the Sports World. His heart kept time with the hopes and dreams of the athlete, known or unknown.

He was a champion of the Athletic Trainer as well. He always had a good word to say about the trainer, who worked hard behind the scenes to make a winner possible. He knew the true worth of a good trainer and told as many as he could in the Sports World about it.

"Doc", as he is affectionately called, by all who knew him, was quick and efficient with his diagnosis. His fingers could find out what the injury was, long before the X-rays proved his findings were correct.

Sports has lost an excellent physician, a zealous fan but most of all a true friend of the Athlete, his trainer and their violent world of action.

Dr. J. Langdon Moss

Born: May 24, 1916

Died: June 15, 1966

Dr. Moss received a B.S. degree from the University of Richmond in 1937; an M.D. degree from the University of Virginia in 1943. He was appointed school and team physician at the University of Richmond in 1955, and remained in that capacity until his death in 1966. Dr. Moss was a dedicated healer, a loyal friend and leader who gave untiringly of his time, talents and wise counsel to mankind.

The Association wishes to recognize with deep appreciation his unique contributions to athletics and to express sorrow at his passing.

Al Sawdy

Al Sawdy, born March 28, 1901 in Hudson, Michigan, died 19 days before his 66th birthday and three months before his scheduled retirement from the staff at Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, Ohio.

Sawdy, completing his 36th year in the athletic training profession, possessed a wide, varied level of experience. He spent 11 years as head athletic trainer on the high school level, 22 years in college and two years in the professional ranks.

He attended the Hudson School System, Hudson, Michigan, dropping out of high school after his sophomore year to enlist in the United States Navy. After a seven year tour in the Navy, he returned to Hudson to finish high school. Upon graduation he enrolled at Ferris Institute, then transferred to Michigan State Normal (now Eastern Michigan U.) from which he graduated in 1930.

His first position was in the fall of 1930 as teacher, football coach, and trainer at Fostoria High School, Fostoria, Ohio. After one year as a coach, he resigned and devoted full time as head athletic trainer until resigning in 1941 to accept the position as head trainer for the Detroit Lions professional football team, Detroit, Michigan.

He spent two seasons with the Lions before moving to Beloit College, Beloit, Wisconsin, in 1943 as athletic trainer, Physical Education instructor and special training instructor for the Army Air Corps Flight Cadets stationed there.

In 1944 he joined the Bowling Green State University staff as head trainer and instructor in physical education.

Sawdy was one of the best known trainers in the United States. He published many articles, organized and spoke at many clinics including the N.A.T.A. and wrote a handbook for the high school trainers.

In 1946 he was instrumental in establishing the Ohio-Michigan-Indiana Trainers Association and was elected its first president the same year.

The noted trainer was selected as a United States Olympic Team Trainer for the 1956 games in Melbourne, Australia, and was one of the trainers for the United States at the Pan-American Games in Chicago in 1959. His highest honor was being inducted into the Helms Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame last June at the National Athletic Trainers Association meeting in Kansas City.

Sawdy was deacon of the First Presbyterian Church in Bowling Green, Ohio. In addition he was affiliated with the Bowling Green local chapter of the Red Cross 20 years and his affiliation with the Red Cross dates back a total of 30 years when

- I. The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board, Robert Gunn.
- II. Logan Wood, Chairman of the Program Committee gave a comprehensive progress report of the 1968 National Clinical Program. The report was discussed and approved.
- III. The tabled proposals by the Professional Advancement Committee were again discussed and approved as presented.
- IV. A report of the meeting of the District secretaries was presented and discussed. The secretaries in an effort to obtain relief in the area of delinquent dues made this proposal:

- VIII. The Executive Secretary was asked to send to each Director a complete breakdown of duties and costs of the national office by July 1st.
- IX. A three member study Committee has been appointed from the Board of Directors to obtain ideas, information, suggestions that will help establish method of finding a replacement or solution for the national office. Appointed to the Committee are Jack Rockwell, Chairman, Chris Patrick and Bill Chambers.

There being no further business, requiring action at this time the meeting was adjourned.
